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Post-prom organizers need your help

Members of the Sturgis Brown High School Post-Prom Committee are asking for help in hosting this year's party following the high school prom Saturday, April 23.

Post-prom, which will be held from 11 p.m. to 3 a.m. in the east gym at the high school, is free to the students, even if they do not attend prom. However, those students must sign-up at the high school office prior to the end of school April 22 if they want to attend post-prom.

In order to keep this event free, parents of all junior and senior students are being asked to donate a minimum of \$10 per family.

"Considering everything that is available at post-prom, this is a pretty fair amount to request per family," said Pam Anderson, chairperson of Post-Prom Committee.

"This event," Anderson said, "is being held to provide a safe, fun and memorable night. We want the students to attend. We want them to make the safe choice of staying at the school and having a great time at post-prom instead of making an unsafe decision and risking their health and life."

Last year \$1,080 was donated

by parents even though it cost more than \$7,000 to put on the event. Thankfully, area businesses were very generous with their donations.

According to Anderson, students who attend post-prom will be able to participate in a variety of games and activities including entertainment by a comedic hypnotist. The photo booth was a big hit last year and so will be available again this year for students to capture those special moments with friends.

Students will have numerous opportunities to win door prizes. Also, several grand prizes will be awarded at the conclusion of the event but students must be present to win. Those prizes include I-Pads, Go-Pro cameras, laptops, headphones, a senior college package consisting of microwave, refrigerator, laundry baskets and bags, plus many other prizes.

Pizza, sandwiches, vegetables, fruit, desserts and beverages will be available throughout the event.

This Old School House

April 23, 1937, meeting of the Board of Education of the City of Sturgis:

It was moved by [H.T.] Snyder and seconded by [Rod] Cruickshank that the teachers hired for 1937-38 are to be under the supervision of the Superintendent as to their subjects assigned to them. Contracts are to be drawn and entered into with each teacher containing the usual provisions and the additional provisions (1st) that each teacher be absolutely prohibited from subscribing to the doctrines of communism or atheism in any form, either by spoken word or written opinion in the classroom, and (2nd) that if the status of any women teacher shall change at any time during the school year, whereby such teacher should not be dependent upon the income derived from such teaching, then the Board of Education reserves the right to terminate such contract without prior notice and without recourse against the District by reason of the termination of such contract. Motion carried unanimously.

Sept. 9, 1940, meeting of the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 12:

Whereas, due to legislative and executive action of our government in calling the National Guard and conscription of others for military service it appears that such action may effect members of our teaching staff, and


Whereas this Board desires to cooperate with the interest of the law in preserving the position of the teaching staff for the period of training or for one year, therefore,

Be it resolved by this Board of Education of this District, that if and when any teacher be called for training in any military service, that such teacher shall be given one years leave of absence, with the privilege to return and resume his position at the end of such year.

Motion for the adoption of the resolution was made by [A.A.] Lushbough and seconded by [Earl] Minturn. Motion carried unanimously.

April 12, 1943, meeting of the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 12:

It was moved by [G.B.] Anderson and seconded by [Roy] Sparks that the treasurer purchase \$5,000 of Series B-1944 7/8ths per cent Treasury Certificates, out of the general fund. Said action being taken in line with the requests now being made to aid the war effort in every possible manner. Motion carried unanimously.



The 1944 Sturgis High School annual, the cover of which is pictured above, was dedicated as follows: "To those who once attended Sturgis High School, and who now are serving their country in order that peace may again reign in a free world of free men, we reverently dedicate this, the 1944 Mato Paha." The dedication page was followed by 12 pages containing photos of 173 service men and women and a list of 95 more for whom photos were not available.

Won: Sturgis Brown High School sophomore **Grayson Nelson** was named the grand prize winner at the 61st annual High Plains Regional Science and Engineering Fair held recently on the campus of South Dakota School of Mines and Technology in Rapid City.

Nelson placed first in the biological science division with his exhibit titled "Devolution of Ampicillin Resistance in E. coli." He also was named recipient of the United States Air Force Certificate of Achievement and the Yale Science and Engineering Association Award.

Nelson will now represent the region at the 2016 Intel International Science and Engineering Fair May 8-13 in Phoenix, Ariz.

Won: The Sturgis Brown High School ProStart team of seniors **Sabrina Day, Felicia Todd** and **Chris Van Asma** took first place in the culinary competition at the ninth annual South Dakota ProStart Invitational held recently at Mitchell Technical Institute.

The trio will now represent the state at the National ProStart Invitational April 29-May 1 in Dallas, Texas.

The students had to prepare a three-course meal in 60 minutes using only two butane burners and with no access to running

water or electricity.

Day also won the chicken fabrication contest which involved taking a whole, raw chicken and cutting it into the required

components. For this year's competition, those components were two boneless airline breasts, two legs and two boneless thighs. She was then judged on safety and sanitation, quality of cuts, amount of waste, and presentation of the cuts.

Culinary arts teacher Coleen Keffeler is also the ProStart instructor. Team mentor is Michael Hagen.

Named: Coleen Keffeler, the culinary arts and ProStart teacher and career and technical education coordinator at SBHS, has been named the 2016 South Dakota ProStart Educator Excellence Award winner by the S.D. Retailers Association Pro Start Program.



ProStart is a nationwide high school curriculum developed by the National Restaurant Association Educational Foundation. It helps prepare high school students for leadership positions in the workplace by teaching skills which are crucial in any place of employment.

Board awards bid for high school remodel; gets first look at capital outlay budget

During a recent special meeting, the Meade School Board awarded the Sturgis Brown High School office/front entrance remodel project to low bidder Scull Construction of Rapid City.

Scull's bid, which included replacing the existing windows along the south exterior wall, was \$551,100. The next closest bid was \$560,300 from Rangel Construction Company of Rapid City.

Meade School District Superintendent Don Kirkegaard said the project will begin immediately after school lets out in May so that it can be completed before school starts in August.

Also during that special meeting, School Business Manager Brett Burditt explained the proposed 2016-17 capital outlay budget, saying it will be more conservative than in the past.

The proposed expenditure budget of \$5,213,206 represents an 8.4 percent increase or \$401,971 more than last year. Burditt said there is also a \$308,137 contingency.

Factors contributing to that increase include the remodeling of the SBHS front entrance and main office, renovating the second floor of the Williams

Administrative Building, and purchasing new social studies textbooks and materials for all grades K-12. Technology enhancements and debt service also continue to push the budget higher, according to Burditt.

The new education funding bill changed how districts request property tax funds. "We will move from a levy request of \$3 per \$1,000 of valuation," explained Burditt, "to a total dollar amount based upon the approved budget for ad valorem taxes."

A public hearing on the 2016-17 budget, of which the capital outlay fund is part, will be held at the board's regular June meeting. Action on that budget will take place at the board's annual meeting in July.

The group-based class for parents focuses on teaching practical skills to increase children's positive behavior, decrease negative behavior, and model appropriate alternative behavior. Goals are to equip parents with a logical method for

changing their children's behaviors through teaching positive behaviors, social skills and methods to reduce stress in crisis situations, and to provide parents with practical strategies for enhancing parent-child communication and building robust family relationships.

The six-week class will be held from 6-8 p.m. on Mondays as follows: April 4, 11, 18, 25 and May 2 and 9. Location is the conference room at Piedmont Valley Elementary School.

In explaining that process to the school board, teacher Kerry Skinner said, "We looked at how well the social studies standards were addressed, the accessibility to on-line textbooks for enrichment lessons, and how the books and materials would engage our students in the learning process." She added, "You really can judge a book by its cover. Books geared toward tech savvy students need to look inviting and entertaining to pique their curiosity."

K-5: Pearson's "My World Social Studies"

6-12: McGraw-Hill series including textbooks on U.S. history, world geography, world history, economics and psychology

Students, staff celebrate Month of the Military Child

April is celebrated throughout the nation as the Month of the Military Child. This special designation offers citizens the opportunity to honor the service of the nation's youngest heroes, the military children. Established by former Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger in 1986, the designation acknowledges the significant role military youth play in the communities.

In 2011, the "Purple Up! for Military Kids" initiative began and is now also celebrated nationwide. In support of this initiative, the students and staff of Meade School District are being encouraged to wear purple on April 15 in honor of military children.

Wearing the color purple is a visible way to show support and thank military youth for their strength and sacrifices. Why purple? Purple is the color that

symbolizes all branches of the military, as it is a combination of Army green, Marine Red, and Coast Guard, Air Force, and Navy blue. The goal of "Purple Up!" is for military youth to actually see the support in their school, youth groups and community.

Other school activities celebrating the military child include a special assembly April 15 at Sturgis Williams Middle School when all military children at the school will be recognized.

Military children and children of veterans at both Sturgis Elementary School and Piedmont Valley Elementary are creating photo displays for their school of their heroes, country of deployment and years of service. All district elementary children are also being encouraged to browse the books about military families on display at their school libraries.

Smarter Balanced assessment is this month

Meade School District students in grades three through eight and grade 11 will be taking the state assessment, Smarter Balanced, this month.

The assessment is done on a computer and measures student achievement in relation to state standards in the areas of English language arts and mathematics. In addition to providing overall scores in those two subjects, reports will provide information regarding reading, writing, listening and research, and math concepts and procedures, problem solving and modeling data analysis and communicating reasoning.

Juniors at Sturgis Brown High School will take the Dakota STEP science test on April 8, the Smarter Balanced math test on April 14, and the Smarter Balanced English test on April 20-21.

Each testing day will begin with a mini-breakfast followed by two hours of testing. While the juniors are testing, the freshmen and sophomores will be registering for next year's classes and working with SDMyLife, which is an online career development program. The seniors don't have to report to school until 10 a.m. on the four testing days, but if they do arrive early, the library will be available for them to do their work and confer with teachers, if needed.

Sturgis Williams Middle School Principal Ann Nonnast said the testing at the middle school will encompass almost the entire month of April. As a motivational kickoff, a pep rally will be held April 4. The eight-graders will then take the Dakota STEP


science test during their regular science classes on April 5-7. The seventh and eighth-graders will take the English and math tests April 11-14, while the sixth-graders will test on April 18-21. Snacks and breaks will be held regularly for the students, and lunch will be provided for staff on testing days.

Specific testing dates aren't scheduled at Piedmont Valley Elementary, but rather times and days within the testing window are selected based on what is best for the students at that time. Snacks and water will be available so the students can stay hydrated and full of energy throughout the testing. The students will be treated to a celebration at the conclusion of the assessments.

Whitewood Elementary and Rural Principal Bev Rosenboom will hand out "Do Your Best on the Test" pencils to all test-takers. In addition, the Whitewood PTO will provide snacks for the students at that school.

In preparation for the test, the students at Sturgis Elementary School have spent extra time improving their keyboarding skills, said Principal Chantal Ligtenberg. To encourage the test-takers, the first and second grade students made good luck cards for the older students with each card containing Smarties candy.

Upon completion of the final test, the Sturgis Elementary students will attend a special assembly titled "Kaleidoscope." In addition, all students at the school will be treated to an extra recess.

Students entering grades four through six will attend from 9 a.m. to noon while those in grades seven through nine will attend from 1-4 p.m. Cost is \$60 which includes a camp t-shirt. For each additional sibling, the cost is \$40. Deadline to register is May 20.

Participants will work with the Scooper basketball players, coaching staff and Mahoney while learning about the fundamentals of basketball. Emphasis will be placed on sportsmanship, teamwork and having fun through competition.

Mahoney, a Piedmont native and 2001 graduate

of SBHS, was a five-year basketball letter winner. As a senior, she was named the Gatorade and USA Today South Dakota Player of the Year, High School Girls Athlete of the Year by the Sports Writers Association, and Miss Basketball South Dakota. She attended Kansas State University where she was a four-year basketball letter winner. She is a former member of the WNBA Connecticut Sun and Houston Comets and is currently playing professional basketball overseas for Team Villeneuve of France.

This is the third year that head coach Jordan Proefrock has worked with Megan Mahoney at the camp. "Every year the camp gets better and more girls come out and participate," said Proefrock. "Going forward with this camp, I hope that all the campers can take more of their own time to work on individual skills. I also hope they watch and listen to Megan and are motivated to become better individual and team players."
