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SBHS Athletic Hall of Fame induction ceremony to be held Friday, Jan. 29

The Sturgis Brown High School Athletic Hall of Fame induction ceremony for the Class of 2016 will be Friday, Jan. 29, during the halftime of the home boys basketball game in the west gym at the high school. Selected for induction are athletes Dan Kessler, Brent Pickar and Brittony Hubbard.

Induction activities include two socials, both of which will take place in the choir room at the high school. The first social will be held from 5:30-6:30 p.m., prior to the girls basketball game, and the second will occur at approximately 7:45 p.m., between the girls and boys games. The socials, sponsored by the Sturgis S-Club and Booster Club, are being held so that the public can meet and greet the three inductees. Light refreshments will be served.

The inductees will be recognized during halftime of the boys basketball game against Belle Fourche at approximately 8:30 p.m., at which time each honoree will receive a commemorative plaque.

Dan Kessler (1967 graduate)

Dan was a three year letter winner in track, basketball and football.

In track, he participated in pole vault, hurdles, long jump, and relays. During the summer of 1964, he won the pole vault at the S.D. Junior Olympic competition and then advanced to the National Junior Olympics.

As a member of the basketball team, he was All-Conference his junior and senior years.

He was an All-Conference football player all three years which included 1964 when the team went undefeated. He was also a two-year member of the All-State team as a running back.

Dan rushed for more than 2,100 yards in 21 games. During his senior year he averaged 23 carries per game and, in one game, carried the ball 32 times. He ran for 969 yards on 160 carries, averaging 6.1 yards per carry and 138 yards per game. During his three years as a football player, he rushed for more than a mile.

Following graduation, he attended Black Hills State where, as a freshman, he was the starting running back and safety on the football team.

Dan lives in Black Hawk and is a four time competitor at the U.S. National Open Table Tennis Tournament held annually in Las Vegas. He enjoys watching his grandchildren and is looking forward to becoming involved in their school activities.

Brent Pickar (1997 graduate)

Brent was a three sport athlete, earning eight varsity letters - three each in track and football, and two in basketball.

Brent was a member of three Black Hills Conference Champion track teams and was a nine-time BHC track champion in individual and relay events.

He medaled 10 times at the State "AA" Track meet, winning events in the 800 and 1600 meter runs and 3200 meter relay. To this day, Brent still holds the school track records in the 400 meter, 1600 meter relay, 3200 meter relay and medley relay.

As a member of the BHC Champion Football Team, he earned First Team All State honors as quarterback and defensive back. During the 1995-96 season, he quarterbacked the team to the semi-final playoff game.

Brent was a white letter honor athlete, and a member of the National Honor Society.

He attended Northern State University on a football scholarship, later finishing his collegiate career at South Dakota State University.

He is a fulltime member of the South Dakota National Guard and in 2003-04 was deployed to Iraq. Since then, he has served missions in Kuwait, Nicaragua, Germany, Italy and Mexico.

Brent lives in Rapid City and has a son.

Brittany Hubbard (2000 graduate)

Brittany was a three sport athlete, earning 10 varsity letters - three each in basketball and golf, and four in volleyball.

As a member of the basketball team, she participated in three state "AA" tournaments and was named to the All-Tournament Team all three years. She was named to the All-GDC Second Team her junior year and All-GDC First Team her senior year. Brittany was one of 15 nominated for the South Dakota 1999 Girls Basketball Player of the Year by the S.D. Basketball Coaches Association.

Her memberships also included the Academic All-GDC and Academic All-State Basketball Teams. She was also a member of the 2000 S.D. Basketball All-Stars.

As a player on the volleyball team, she participated in the state "AA" tournament during her senior year. Over the course of her four years in volleyball, she was named to both the GDC Volleyball Team First Team and Honorable Mention Team, Academic All-GDC Team, and Academic All-State Team.

Brittany was a white letter honor athlete, and a three-year member of the National Honor Society.

Scooptown Classic tournament is this month

The 15th Annual Sturgis Scooptown Classic Basketball Tournament for girls in fourth through eighth grades will be held Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 23-24, at Sturgis Brown High School. The tournament is a fundraiser for the Sturgis girls basketball teams.

Entry fee for the tournament is \$150 per team with each team guaranteed three games. Deadline to register is Jan. 15.

Teams must supply their own warm-up balls and are strongly encouraged to wear uniforms with visible numbers on both the front and back. Players may com-

pete in their own grade division or upper divisions but many not participate in a lower grade division.

South Dakota high school rules apply with the following exceptions:

- A game will consist of two 18-minute halves.

- Teams may press only if the score is within 10 points.

- The fourth grade division is not allowed to press, zone or use full court defense.

- The fifth grade division may use full court defense the last two minutes if the scoring difference is 10 points or less.

- Overtime will consist of two

minutes of play.

- Coaches are allowed three one-minute timeouts during play of game which includes regulation and overtime.

Admission is \$5 for adults and \$3 for school-age children, which covers both days of the tournament.

Sturgis Brown High School students participating in Close Up are selling raffle tickets for a 50-inch smart HDTV as a fundraiser for their trip to Washington, D.C., this spring.

Tickets, which are \$10 each or three for \$25, are available this month at the home basketball games and wrestling matches. The drawing will be held Jan. 22 during halftime of the boys basketball game.

The government studies program gives students a one-of-a-kind opportunity to experience government in action, taking what they learn in the classroom and bringing it to life. From visits to Washington's famous monuments, memorials and institutions to meetings with South Dakota's

congressional delegation, those participating in Close Up get a first-hand look at the American political system while considering the role they, as students, can play.

During their April 24-29, 2016, stay in Washington, the students will attend seminars on Capitol Hill and meet government officials, political figures, lobbyists and representatives of the Washington press corps to learn more about the federal process. The Sturgis students will be blended with students from other areas of the country for daily debates, discussions and activities.

Cost is approximately \$1,900 per student, which includes flight, lodging, meals, ground trans-

portation and program tuition. This fundraiser will help defray a portion of the cost.

Jan. 11 meeting of school board includes presentations about relocating SBHS office and possible middle school at Stagebarn

The monthly meeting of the Meade School Board will be held at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 11, in the board room of the Williams Administrative Building, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis.

A representative of the certified public accounting firm of Casey Peterson and Associates will present results of the district's audit review that the firm recently conducted. Representatives of Architecture Incorporated will present two program reports. The first report will be about the proposed relocation of the main office at Sturgis Brown High School.

The architectural firm will present plans for relocating the high school office closer to the main entrance of the school as a way of making the facility more secure. "We would like the board to consider not only moving the high school office, but also the offices of the counselors, nurse and activities director to that location," said Superintendent Don Kirkegaard. Three classrooms currently located across from the main office would be relocated to accommodate the move.

With the office relocation, the high school would become the latest school in the district to utilize a buzz-in entry system as a way of promoting safety of students and staff. At a specific time in the morning, the school doors would be locked and anyone wanting to enter the school must press a button on the intercom/camera mounted on the exterior wall near the front door. Depressing the button activates a phone in the school office.

Office personnel, who will be able to see the visitor on a special phone, will answer the call, requesting the visitor to identify himself/herself and state the purpose for entering the school. The staff member then activates the door and the visitor will enter the school via the newly relocated office.

Feedback from parents about this system at the middle school and elementary schools has been favorable.

Architecture Incorporated will also present a report and plans for a possible middle school building project at the Stagebarn site in the Summerset area.

Agenda items up for action include financial reports, personnel, memorandums of understanding with the City of Sturgis for the Little League Fields and Woodle Field and amending the 2015-16 school calendar as it pertains to parent teacher conferences at the high school and middle school.

Discussion items include the January staff inservice, Blue Ribbon Task Force, open enrollment for 2015-16, Policy EJ "Service Animals," window project at Williams Administrative Building and school election polling locations.

The meeting will be preceded by an executive session for the purposes of personnel, marketing and negotiations.

School District #12

The meeting was called to consider and approve the following school district budget prepared by Superintendent [Ken] Hauge and the finance committee for the 1966-67 school year.

Motion by [Bruce] Walker and seconded by [Jerry] Neugebauer that the district budget be approved as stated. Upon roll call vote, all members voted yes.

Jan. 10, 1967, meeting of Sturgis Ind. School District #12

Principal R.B. Williams outlined plans to establish a pilot program in the eighth grade for the second semester to teach social studies on a current topic

basis. Some of the guidelines for the program have been established from research by the area ESEA/Title IV project of which Williams directs on a part-time basis. Williams informed the board that some of the material presented to the students may be of controversial nature, but will be taught from an objective viewpoint.

Dec. 12, 1967, meeting of Sturgis Ind. School District #12

Superintendent Hauge reported that recently received messages from Senator Mundt and Representative Berry indicate that 495 acres of land and 12 farm-type buildings are in the process of being transferred from the General Services Administration to Sturgis Ind. School District #12. The possible use to be made of the transferred land was briefly discussed, however, Hauge cautioned the board that ultimate use of the property will be based on the terms of original application.

May 29, 1968, meeting of Sturgis Ind. School District #12

The board agreed that Lyle Murphey, 1968 graduate, be recipient of the board's annual scholarship in the amount of \$200. Funds for said scholarship are personally donated equally by members of the school board.

Feb. 10, 1986, meeting of Meade School District 46-1

Meade Education Association

has circulated and filed petitions requesting that the size of the school board be reduced from nine to seven members. Motion by [Curt] Nupen seconded by [Marguerite] Kleven, and carried that a special election be scheduled for Tuesday, March 18, 1986.

April 15, 1986, meeting of Meade School District 46-1

Results of special election held March 18 were examined by the Board. Motion by [Mimi] Shewey, seconded by [David] Hersrud, and carried that the election results to consider reducing the number of school board members from nine to seven be recorded as follows: for decreasing the number of members - 310; against decreasing the number of members - 590.

Jan. 20, 1987, meeting of Meade School District 46-1

A group of people in Sturgis are working on a proposal for a community center which will be located near the Bear Butte School. The finance committee of that group is asking for the District's position on the matter. Specifically, it wants to know whether the District supports the concept and if so, whether the District would use the facility.

Motion by [David] Hersrud seconded by [Ross] Lamphere and carried that the District indicates its support for the community center project and that it would consider using the facility.

District receives \$10,100 from Sturgis Rally Charities Foundation

Meade School District programs or initiatives recently received a total of \$10,100 from the Sturgis Rally Charities Foundation.

Topping the list with \$5,000 was the Meade School District nurses' office. Nurses Julie Dobler, Jennifer Oedekoven and Marcia Potts said the money will be used to bring the Delta Dental Dakota Smiles Mobile Dental Program back to the district. During the 10 years the dental

bus has visited the school district, \$457,755 worth of services have been provided to students.

Sturgis Williams Middle School Principal Ann Nonnast said the \$2,000 received by the middle school will be used to bring Rachel's Challenge back to the school for the fifth time since the initial appearance in January of 2013.

Rachel's Challenge is a series of student empowering programs and strategies that promote a cul-

ture of kindness and compassion.

The Meade School District Gifted Program received \$300 which will be used for registrations for competitions such as Destination Imagination.

Affiliated organizations supporting Meade School District students received money as follows: Sturgis Brown High School Post-Prom Committee, \$2,000; Sturgis Elementary School PTA, \$500; and the Whitewood Elementary School PTO, \$300.

A decision must be made whether to leave or stay, and the vote is to venture forth, despite what might lie ahead.
