District receives \$9,550

Meade School District programs or initiatives recently received a total of \$9,550 from the Sturgis Rally Charities Foundation.

Topping the list with \$5,000 was the Meade School District nurses' office. Nurses Julie Dobler, Randi Oviatt and Marcia Potts said the money will be used to bring the Dakota Smiles Mobile Dental Program to the district.

The cost of this Delta Dental Foundation program is \$2,500 per week. The dental bus will be stationed this month at Whitewood Elementary School and Union Center School, and next November at the high school. During the last nine years, Meade School District students have received almost \$400,000 worth of dental services through this program.

Registration for kindergarten and screening of children birth to six will be held in March

School registration for kindergarten and screenings for birth to six-year-old children will be held this March at four locations throughout Meade School District.

The kindergarten registration has been combined with the screening to save time for parents. This pre-registration for the 2014-15 school year is open to children who will be five years of age by Sept. 1, 2014, and who plan on attending school in the fall.

Parents registering a child for kindergarten will need the child's immunization records and a certified copy of the child's birth certificate or affidavit in lieu of the birth certificate as issued by the Department of Health if the original is deemed unattainable. These documents are required by law for every child entering school in South Dakota. Parents are also asked to provide their child's Social Security number.

The screenings are for children planning to attend kindergarten in the fall of 2014 as well as for those children up to six years of age about whom parents have concerns regarding their development. Children attending the screening will be evaluated in the areas of vision, hearing, speech, language, gross and fine motor skills, and cognitive skills. The evaluations performed during the screening are provided free of charge and take approximately one hour.

Career and Electives Fairs set for SBHS

Students at Sturgis Brown High School will soon be choosing courses for the coming school year and to assist them in making those selections both a Career Fair and Electives Fair will be held.

The staff at the high school and area businesses are gearing up to present the school's seventh annual Career Fair Wednesday, Feb. 19, in the west gym of the school at which time students will have a chance to explore a variety of career opportunities.

Representatives of area businesses, governmental agencies and post-secondary institutions will be present to answer questions and discuss their careers with the students.

"All students are career bound and this fair will help them make informed choices about their options," said Coleen Keffeler, career and technical education coordinator at the high

school. "This fair will also help the students make better course selections as they begin registering for next year's classes."

The fifth annual Electives Fair will be held Wednesday, March 5, also in the west gym. Electives are courses a student may take but which are not required in order to graduate from high school such as creative writing,

Booths with information about the courses will be set up in the west gym. Fair organizers hope the students will take advantage of the opportunity to see the variety of high quality electives offered at the high school before they start registering for the 2014-15 school year.

Sturgis Williams Middle School Assistant Principal Ann Nonnast and Counselor Kellie Thomas said the \$1,500 received by the middle school will be used to bring Rachel's Challenge back to the school. The program, first presented in January 2013 and then again in September 2013, is a series of student empowering programs and strategies that equip students and adults to combat bullying and allay feelings of isolation and despair by creating a culture of kindness and compassion.

SBHS activities secretary Audrey Schroeder, on behalf of the S Club, will use the \$1,000 received from the Sturgis Rally Charities Foundation to purchase a new Scooper Sam costume, the cost of which is approximately \$6,000.

The current Scooper Sam costume, which is more than 20 years old, is in very poor condition. The SBHS class of 2013 has donated \$1,925 toward a new costume, plus Schroeder has been collecting Lynn's cash register receipts with that money earmarked for the costume.

Schroeder hopes to raise enough funds for the costume by the time she retires at the end of this school year. Anyone interested in donating to the project can contact her at the activities office at 347-4487.

New selection process will be used

Nominations sought for Teacher of the Year and Professional Technical/Support Staff

Nominations for Teacher of the Year and Professional Technical and Support Staff of the Year for 2014 are now being accepted.

The nomination forms will be available beginning Feb. 10 at the district office and at all school administrative offices and on the school district website:

Nominations are welcome from parents, community members and staff members. The official nomination form must be used and must be accompanied by a minimum of three letters of recommendation from persons other than the nominator.

A new selection process is being used this year that will allow each administrative site to submit a nominee for each of the districtwide awards. The method of selecting the nominee will be determined by the administration at each site.

All nominations must be received by Tuesday, March 18, by the principal/supervisor of the person being nominated. If unsure of the name of the principal/supervisor, call the communications office at 347-2523 x3.

Once the nominees from each administrative site have been finalized, a committee consisting of five administrators and two school board members will select one Teacher of the Year

and one Professional Technical and Support Staff of the Year. The district communications specialist Kris Hubbard will serve as chairperson of the committee.

These two winners, plus the nominees from each administrative site, will be honored at the year-end Recognition and Retirement Reception.

All nominees for Teacher of the Year should be exceptionally skilled and dedicated, should be poised and articulate, and should have the respect and admiration of students, parents and co-workers. The nominees should play active and useful roles in their communities and schools, often distinguishing themselves as leaders.

The most important qualification to consider when nominating

a teacher is his or her ability to inspire learning in students of all abilities and backgrounds.

The purpose of the Professional Technical and Support Staff of the Year award is to recognize outstanding staff members who are not teachers. The award is based on a variety of criteria including motivation on the job, performance, cooperation with others, knowledge of the job, and contributions to the betterment of the school and district. Nominees should also exemplify a genuine commitment to professionalism and exhibit excellence in his or her work.

Nominees for both awards must be planning to return to Meade School District for the 2014-15 school year.

Dental bus at Whitewood and rural area this month

The Dakota Smiles Mobile Dental Bus will be returning to the Meade School District Feb. 10-14 when it will be stationed at Whitewood Elementary and the rural schools.

Because of its relationship with local dentists, many of whom volunteer their services, the program is able to offer cost effective, high quality oral health services to children who would otherwise go without. Those services include cleanings, preventive services, fillings and oral health education, and are available to students who have not seen a dentist in two years, or who live more than 85 miles from a dentist.

One-to-One Technology Initiative: Putting a computer into the hands of every student

Technology took center stage at the January meeting of the Meade School Board.

Dr. Julie Mathiesen, an alumna of and former teacher at Sturgis Brown High School who is director of Technology and Innovation in Education (TIE) for Black Hills Special Services, addressed the board about her vision of the future of learning with technology.

“Our schools are operating on a 100-year-old system of learning and teaching, which might not be the best way to do things anymore,” she said. “With all the customization in our life, why is education still so one-dimensional,” she asked. “When the ratio is one teacher to 25 students it is tough to personalize teaching. We need to make education more accessible, individualized and engaging, and technology can help do that.”

Her 45-minute talk included an interactive presentation of how technology can meet every learner at his or her learning level, provide learning opportunities that sync with the learner’s most effective learning styles, and enable the learner to study and learn skills and concepts using content that is relevant and interesting.

Sturgis Brown High School Principal Jeff Simmons and teachers Kristin Wheaton and Deb Cano explained the process undertaken by them and the

other members of the One-to-One Technology Initiative Committee at the high school – Jon Swan, Stephanie Kaufman, Jolene Kayser, Tere Froelich and Coleen Keffeler – in determining which device best suits the high school. Their choice: Apple MacBook Air.

In explaining their laptop recommendation, the educators cited its durability, portability, quick startup and shutdown, long battery life, ability to share documents without the use of wireless Internet, and Apple’s professional development for staff.

“We don’t want our new

devices to be a typewriter,” said Simmons, “but if we give it to teachers without any training that is what it will be. The Apple people spent a lot of time talking about the importance of professional development, which they will provide in order to get us to where we need to be, and that is important,” Simmons said.

The laptops for the teachers have been ordered. The school board members plan on discussing the timeline for the purchase of the student laptops and the schedule for teacher professional development at their Tuesday, Feb. 11, meeting.

Nominated: Sturgis Brown High School teacher and head wrestling coach **Steve Keszler** has been named a finalist from South Dakota for the 2014 National Wrestling Coach of the Year. The announcement of the winner will occur this June at the National High School Athletic Coaches Association convention in Jackson Hole, Wyo. The national award is presented to one athletic director and one coach in each of 18 different sports for their lifetime achievement, not just for a

season of coaching. Award recipients are evaluated on longevity, professional service, win-loss percentage, championship years, and professional awards.

This is the second time Keszler has been a finalist for the award; the first time was in 2010.

Scored: Sturgis Brown High School's **Lynsey Prosser** scored her 1,000th career point in a 60-24 win over Alliance on Jan. 11 in girls basketball action in Alliance, Neb., where she had 27 points and 11 rebounds. Scooper Head Coach Mike Friedel refers to her as one of the best perimeter

Teacher Jean Karsten one of 26 to receive classroom innovation grant from SD DOE

Sturgis Brown High School special education teacher Jean Karsten was one of 26 educators statewide to be awarded a Classroom Innovation Grant through the S.D. Department of Education. Karsten received \$23,300 with which she purchased 20 laptops for her students with learning disabilities, and a cart for storage and mobility.

“In the new test-taking culture, students with learning disabilities struggle to meet higher academic expectations,” said Karsten. “Lowering stress and improving academic performance is a major challenge but I believe that the use of our new technology devices to support and encourage these students will result in increased academic achievement and enhanced mental and social well-being.”

The laptops arrived the end of September so the students are beginning their fifth month of learning with them, and, according to Karsten, are demonstrating confidence with the technology. In addition to using the laptops to complete daily assignments, the students are taking assessments to prepare for the Smarter Balance test and are participating in project-based learning activities.

The computers are being used almost every

hour of the school day and by several grade levels of students including general education classes. Freshmen are using them to work on new Common Core math curriculum and standards for writing, sophomores and juniors are using them to complete research papers, while some senior science students are using them to work on equations.

“Receiving this grant has not only been incredibly helpful to my students,” said Karsten, “it has also allowed me to help them grow and learn to better use technology to enhance their future.”

Karsten’s grant was funded by the 2013 Legislature that designated \$500,000 in one-time money for the S.D. Department of Education to provide grants of up to \$25,000 to fund classroom innovation, allowing classroom teachers to utilize technology in creative and innovative ways to enhance the learning and achievement of their students.

Drivers education sign up is now underway

Sign up is currently underway for driver education classes offered this summer through the Meade School District's Curriculum Office. The session is scheduled for 9 a.m.-noon. Monday through Friday, June 2-13.

Cost is \$274, which must be paid in advance. Registration deadline is May 23, however, once the class is full, registration ends. Placement will be on a first-come, first-served basis.

The class will be held in Room 120 at Sturgis Brown High School.

Students must be at least 14 years of age and must attend the entire 30 hours of classroom instruction. In addition, six hours of driving time is required, which must be individually scheduled with the instructor and completed by the first week of July 2014.

Many insurance companies give discounts to those who have completed a driver education course. Completing the course also reduces the time a student must hold an Instructional Permit from 180 days to 90 days before that student can get a Restricted Minor's Permit or an Operator's License.
