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Board considers land purchase

Final action on the purchase of land adjacent to the old Stagebarn School building will take place during the Aug. 13 meeting of the Meade School Board set for 6:30 p.m. in the board room of the Williams Administrative Building, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis.

The nine members of the school board have been discussing the issue since the June board meeting when they voted to sign a 90-day option to

purchase the six acres of land located southeast of the building.

"Whether you do something next year or 20 years from now, that property is valuable to the district," said Meade District Superintendent Don Kirkegaard.

The purchase price of \$575,000 would be paid in interest free installments over the next three years.

Purchase of the property would give the district about 23 acres of land at that location.



The land being considered for purchase is a storage unit business, indicated by the red star above, and is southeast of the Stagebarn building, pictured at the left, which has been vacant for the past two years.

School board reorganizes; adopts budget

The old Meade School Board was adjourned and the new board was seated during the annual July meeting.

Outgoing board members Wanda Blair and Nancy Richter were each presented a school bell and a commemorative slate chalkboard in recognition of their years of service. Blair, from Vale, has served 12 years while Enning resident Richter has been a board member for the last six years.

Following the bell presentation, the oath of office was administered to new board members Curt Nupen of Piedmont and Bryce Richter of Sturgis, and re-elected member Bob Burns of Black Hawk.

A number of organizational items, including election of officers, were decided at the meeting. Burns,

who is beginning his fifth year on the board, was elected president while Courtney Mack, a two-year board member from Sturgis, was elected vice president.

During the meeting, the members of the school board, which also include Dennis Chowen and Chad Legner of Sturgis, Juanita Harrington and Don Williamson of Piedmont, and Shelli Grinager of Summerset, unanimously approved the proposed \$23.7 million budget for 2013-14.

The General Fund of \$15,547,119 represents an increase of \$606,234 or 4 percent. This increase can be attributed to a 9 percent increase in insurance costs plus health care reform fees and compliance

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This Old School House



Dec. 15, 1966, meeting of the Sturgis Independent School District #12:

Principal Williams Brown informed the Board of the results of compiled enrollment data for the Sturgis School System over a 25-year period and illustrated the results with charts and graphs. The study, made by Brown, indicated a steady enrollment increase over the period and a 10-year projection from the study indicated the likelihood of 3,000 students in the year 1977. Current enrollment is 1,324 in grades 1-8 and 692 in grades 9-12.

Feb. 7, 1967, meeting:

Superintendent Ken Hauge informed the board that an invitation has been extended to the Sturgis High School band to perform at the South Dakota State Fair in Huron in September. Motion by [Jerry] Neugebauer and seconded by [Bruce] Walker that the band be authorized to attend the 1967 State Fair and that transportation charges of \$436 and lodging for one night for the band members be approved. Upon roll call vote, all members voted yes.

June 6, 1967, meeting:

Mr. Owen McDermott, chairman of the Sturgis City Park Board, and Sturgis Mayor Francis Langin discussed with the board the desirability of rest rooms at the athletic field and the possibili-

ty of a joint building and operational plan for the provision of such facility. It was determined that the facility could serve city park visitors as well as the public at athletic events. Motion by [Jerry] Neugebauer and seconded by [John] Stingley that the following resolution be adopted: Whereas, there exists a need for rest room facilities at Woodle Athletic Field, and the City of Sturgis and the Sturgis Independent School District #12 can jointly share such a facility, and, Whereas the City of Sturgis has agreed to bring in water and electricity to the site of the facility and has additionally agreed to provide perpetual payment of utility bills, maintenance and janitorial service to the facility. Therefore, Be It Resolved that the District provide funds for construction of a suitable restroom facility Woodle Field, and that the business manager be instructed to secure plans and specifications for consideration by the board and the City of Sturgis for subsequent bid letting. Upon roll call vote, all members voted ves."

July 27, 1967, meeting:

Superintendent Hauge presented a request by Sister Philomene, principal of St. Francis Catholic School. Motion by [Bruce] Walker and seconded by [Chris] Mechling that if possible with available, staff, Sturgis School District #12 extend the use of facilities and instructors to

St. Francis Catholic School on a share time basis in the regular school program of physical education, music and science for approximately 15 7th grade and 11 8th grade school students. Motion carried.

Oct. 16, 1968, meeting:

The board was informed of group health insurance premium Equitable increase by Life Insurance Company. The premium for individually insured raised from \$9.20 to \$11.32; and individuals with dependents from \$24.93 to \$30.67 monthly. Justification for the increase, as given by Equitable, was based upon increased hospital costs and the past year's claim experience by the District's group participants. It was moved, seconded and passed that the board's share of one-half the cost per insured individual be changed to allow a \$12.50 maximum per insured individual monthly effective Dec. 1, 1968.

June 25, 1969, meeting:

Business Manager [Wayne] Davis reported that salvageable lumber from the bleachers remaining after the fire at Woodle Field has been used by patients of Fort Meade VA Hospital to build 32 benches for the school and Little League baseball fields in Sturgis. Other salvageable dimensional lumber has been hauled to the school farm site for later use in the construction of corrals, gates and fences.

Free and reduced-price breakfast and lunch are available in Meade School District

Free and reduced-price breakfast and lunch are available in the Meade School District to students from families whose household income falls within eligibility guidelines.

The district is able to offer a lower cost or no charge for these meals because it participates in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, both of which are federally-assisted programs.

The reduced price for breakfast is 30 cents while the cost for a reduced lunch is 40 cents. The full price for those meals are \$1.55 for breakfast and \$2.70 for lunch.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for free or reduced-price meals regardless of the income of the household in which they reside.

Not only do the participating

children receive a nutritionally balanced meal, but the school district benefits when a high number of students participate in the program.

Those benefits include an increase in Title I services, additional federal funds for the food service department, increased eligibility of the district for federal and state grants, and an increased reimbursement rate of costs relating to school internet use and phone services.

For those who choose not to take advantage of the online service, Meade Food Service will continue to accept advance payments by cash or check. When paying in that manner, the student's ID number must be included so payment is credited to the correct account.

costs, increases in staff salaries, and an increase in personnel in the elementary schools due to growth in student enrollment.

The Special Services budget increased by \$7,437 or .02 percent, going from \$3,113,288 to \$3,120,725. The increase is the result of an increase in child count, a 9 percent increase in insurance costs and a 4 percent increase in salaries.

The Capital Outlay fund increased \$461,267, or 11 percent from last year for a total of \$4,668,567. Factors contributing to the increase include technology purchases on the elementary level to meet state testing requirements and the remodeling of the second floor of the Williams Administrative Building to accommodate enrollment increases at Sturgis

Elementary. The Pension Fund increased by \$9,340 or .02 percent for a total budget of \$432,220.

The school board also approved the following property tax requests in dollars per thousand: <u>General Fund</u>: Ag \$2.090, Owner-occupied \$4.296, Other \$9.200; <u>Special Education Fund</u>: \$1.476; <u>Capital Outlay Fund</u>: \$3; <u>Pension Fund</u>: \$0.30.

The general fund uniform levy is determined annually by the legislature. Those taxes paid on land designated as agriculture decreased from \$2.322 to \$2.090 per thousand while the taxes paid on owner-occupied property increased from \$4.029 to \$4.296. The levy on the other category, which is primarily commercial property, increased from last year's \$8.628 per thousand.

Ward is Curriculum Leader of the Year

Meade School District Curriculum and Technology Director Jeff Ward has been named the 2013 Curriculum Leader of the Year by the S.D. Association of Supervision of Curriculum Development. The purpose of the award is to recognize and honor a person who has promoted and implemented innovative curriculum development in the state.

Five years ago Ward transitioned from being a middle school band teacher to district curriculum director. "That move was a tremendous shift in responsibilities," said one of his nominators, who added that he has done so with an incred-

ible flair. "I am truly amazed at how he has taken on those responsibilities and gotten up to speed on so many varied issues in such a short period of time."

Jeff's nominators feel he has risen to the challenges of leading a large, diverse school district in the areas of standards implementation, technology demands, accreditation reviews, curriculum selection and implementation, and curriculum department planning. "Sometimes the people who do their jobs and do them well need acknowledgement also," they wrote in the nomination.

A nominator said he handles himself in front of staff, school board and in other settings with a high degree of professionalism. "Jeff put a great deal of work into preparing the Meade District for its recent

"This award is a testament to the hard work Jeff does for our school district," said Superintendent Don Kirkegaard. "We are fortunate to have him as our curriculum director."

Karen Speed selected this year's Educational Office Professional

She has worked as an office professional since 1991, when she became administrative assistant for Whitewood Elementary School and the rural schools. She is a strong advocate for membership in SDAEOP, having held offices on the local, area and state levels, culminating her service as president of the statewide group.

Her nomination for this award was supported by letters of recommendation. Wrote one nominator, "As a member of the staff at Whitewood Elementary School I found her to be positive, upbeat and genuinely interested in the well being of the people around her. Her work ethic is exceptional and her assistance and insight invaluable. Her cheerful personality and friendly smile is a welcome and stable asset to staff, students and patrons."

While on the job, Karen can be found involved in a multitude of activities such as secretary, nurse, bus supervisor, playground and lunch monitor, creative decorator and researcher - a jack-of-all-trades. "Her job description is varied but her commitment to the well

On the days she is at the rural office she is busy answering questions, dispensing materials and providing other organizational support to the eight rural teachers there. "She is their lifeline between their remote sites and the center of the district which is Sturgis," said a nominator.

"Karen presents a friendly face and voice to the public who call or

stop in the office," said another nominator. "She listens to concerns and has a great ability to sort out what she can help with or what should be referred, and she does so professionally and ethically."

Said one of her former principals, "I found her moral qualities above reproach. Her personal characteristics such as patience, consideration, emotional stability and good judgment were and are a tremendous asset to Whitewood, the rural schools and the entire school district. She is recognized as a leader among the district office staff, teachers and administration."

Karen has trained three principals, including current Principal Bev Rosenboom. "Each of us would tell you that her laughter, sense of humor and ever-present smile make the work day bearable and sometimes interesting," offered Rosenboom, "because she must have a little bit of leprechaun in her. There have been times when I have shook my head in disbelief at what she has done to brighten the day for any and all in the building."

"When I was in college, a professor told us that the most important person in the school is the administrative assistant," said Rosenboom, "and they were right. With the start of this school year, the Sturgis Scoopers begin inching their way back into the Black Hills Conference after 15 years as a member of the now-disbanded Greater Dakota Conference.

The Scoopers have membership in the BHC this year in football, only, which will include two divisions: the Mount Rushmore Division consisting of Sturgis, Belle Fourche, Spearfish, Douglas, Hot Springs and St. Thomas More, and the Crazy Horse Division consisting of Custer, Lead-Deadwood, Red Cloud, Pine Ridge, Bennett County and Little Wound.

Next year, cross country, boys and girls golf, and track and field will be allowed to join. Starting with the 2015-16 season, volleyball and boys and girls basketball will become members.

"The BHC will definitely give us great competition with the ability to rekindle old rivalries," said Activities Director Mike Paris. "We will also save a tremendous amount of money and travel time while at the same time playing a well-rounded schedule with schools a little more our size."

The Scoopers will continue to play both Rapid City schools and select schools in the Eastern South Dakota Conference plus the Nebraska schools of Alliance and Chadron.

Prior to the creation of the GDC, which consisted of the four schools from Sioux Falls, the two Rapid City schools and Sturgis (Spearfish had been a member before dropping

out at the beginning of the 2011-12 school year), SBHS was not affiliated with any conference after getting voted out of the Black Hills Conference in 1996.

Public attendance welcomed at all school board meetings

All meetings of the Meade School Board are open to the public and all actions authorized or required by law are taken at those meetings. The school board welcomes attendance at meetings by employees, students, parents, and members of the community.

The school board meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the board room located in the Williams Administrative Building, 1230 Douglas Street, Sturgis, except for the month of July, when the statutory annual organizational meeting is held on the second Monday.

The school board is an elected body created according to the laws of the state to serve as the governing board of the school district for the purpose of organizing, maintaining and locating schools and for providing educational opportunities and services for all citizens residing within the school district.

The school board has the general charge, direction and management of the schools of the district and control and care of all property belonging to it. The direction provided by the board is not the day-to-day operation of the school system. Rather, the school board is a policy-making entity.

Patrons who wish to discuss a matter with the board or who want items placed on the meeting agenda are asked to contact the superintendent 10 days prior to the meeting by calling 347-2523 x 2.

In Touch to become monthly publication

The Meade School District quarterly e-newsletter In Touch is undergoing another transformation beginning this October when the frequency of publication changes to monthly.

"Technology has become a large part of our schools and lifestyles, and as a result we have seen the decline of print and the transition to digital publishing," said Meade School District Superintendent Don Kirkegaard. "We are once again rebooting for the digital age by increasing the frequency we publish our districtwide newsletter so that we can more timely disseminate information regarding the school district and its programs and operations," he said.

"The school board is currently discussing a number of issues - such as overcrowding

at Sturgis and Piedmont elementary schools and the future of the Stagebarn facility - of which the public needs to be aware and from whom we want input. Getting this type of information out to our patrons and taxpayers in a more timely fashion is important to the school board," said the superintendent.

Kirkegaard added that the district's use of local newspapers, broadcast and social media to get the word out to stakeholders will continue.

The first issue of In Touch was published in August of 2004 and was started as a pilot communications program. In the spring of 2005, the readers were surveyed, and 82 percent of them considered In Touch to be a valuable source of information.

Eighty-seven percent of those same respondents indi-

cated that the district should continue to publish newsletter in the future. With that level of support from the public, the school board made the decision to continue to fund the program as an ongoing and integral part of school district operations.

During the 2011 legislative funding for K-12 school districts was cut by 6.6 percent. To save money, the Meade School Board eliminated all publishing, printing and mailing costs associated with In Touch, resulting in an online-only publication. The quarterly newsletter in this format has been in existence since the 2011-12 school year.

(A limited number of hard copies of each issue are printed for distribution to the local libraries.)

Fourth grade to pilot iPads in the classroom

Fourth grade students throughout Meade School District and all students at the rural Elm Springs School will be using iPads in the classroom this coming school year as a pilot project through the district curriculum and technology office.

Curriculum and Technology Director Jeff Ward said the plan is to start small and determine the best use of technology for teaching and learning. "This may grow in future years depending on the value of this pilot project," he said.

Sturgis Brown High School is considering different technology models that may be implemented in the next couple years, so a small group of teachers at that school will be testing Chromebooks and iPads during the first semester of this school year.


The results of the fourth grade and high school pilots will help provide direction to Sturgis Williams Middle School, who is also considering a variety of options for technology in the classroom.

"The cost of devices such as the iPad has dropped to a point where they are more affordable," said Ward. "The amount of information and tools available digitally seems to justify the cost. Many decisions will need to be made over the next 12 months as the district considers its classroom technology options."
